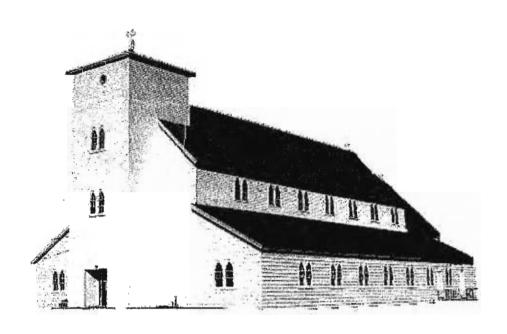

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ANNUAL CONGREGATIONAL MEETING MARCH 2, 2003

The annual meeting of All Saints' Congregation was held in the Parish Hall on Sunday at 5:30 p.m. with a potluck dinner and fifty-five people in attendance.

Heber Best chaired the meeting, welcomed everyone and thanked those who organized the meal and brought dishes.

Regrets were received from Madeline Critchell and Calvin Taylor.

We were advised that Rev. David Burrows and George & Clarissa Hiscock may be here later after their return from the service at The Salmonier Correctional Institute.

Rev. Canon Derek led the Prayer and Praise time of our meeting. Many beautiful songs were sung, scripture reading by Gloria, prayers of Thanksgiving, for Parish Life and for Guidance by Canon Derek.

The minutes of the last annual meeting were approved on a motion by Ken Scott, seconded by Kevin Pittman. Carried.

The General Financial Statements were presented by Barry Tilley, our Financial Advisor, who moved the acceptance of the reports, seconded by Al Decker. Carried.

The Cemetery Report was also presented by Barry. Eric Taylor moved its acceptance, seconded by Barbara Coffin. Carried.

The Budget for 2003 was then presented in the total amount of \$323,900. Included in this budget were two new items – Choir Gowns, and a new sound/video system. These items would cost approximately \$10,400. George Petten moved acceptance of this budget, seconded by Ken Scott. Carried.

Heber thanked Barry for his outstanding efforts and work with the Finances again this year.

Parish Reports were then received. Rev. Canon Derek highlighted some things not mentioned in the reports.

He thanked Madonna for her work and informed us that she would be resigning at the end of May; thanked Al Decker for his work as Warden and the other outgoing members of Vestry – Barb Coffin, Barb Porter, Heber Best, Percy Greenslade and Amanda Cable. Canon Derek advised us that there are a couple of new events upcoming – a Missioner will be with us in Holy Week and for the fall, a Parish Strategy Program is being planned. He moved the acceptance of his report. This was seconded by Heber. Carried.

As our Parish representative on the Board of Directors of the Food Bank, Heber informed us that \$7,005 (food value and cash) had gone to the Food Bank from our parishioners during the past year, plus a \$1,000 budgeted amount from the parish. Heber's term finished in March. Doreen Jeffers will take over from him.

The meeting concluded at 8:45 p.m. with the singing of When the Sun Comes Up Tomorrow, followed by a Closing Prayer by Archdeacon Owen.

RECTOR'S REPORT

Giving to Others: All Saints rang in the New Year of 2003 with a New Year's Eve Party which raised \$1721 for the CBS/Paradise Food Bank. Support for the Food Bank was ongoing throughout the year, culminating with the Christmas Hamper Drive in December. Charity at All Saints begins at home but does not stop there. A number of parishioners contributed toward the cost of replacing the church in Leading Tickles which had been destroyed by fire. \$1400 was given to Badger Flood Relief. Our ongoing support of the Primate's World Relief and Development Fund continued with a gift of \$8000; \$2000 was given to Queen's College and \$500 to the Canadian Bible Society. A donation of \$310 was made to the CLB Avalon Battalion East; \$247.97 was given to the CLB Regimental Band. And once again All Saints parishioners gave generously to the Samaritan's Purse Operation Christmas Child with a contribution of some 250 Christmas Shoe boxes.

<u>New in 2003:</u> In January the Program Committee launched a new initiative whereby families who have loved ones buried from All Saints are invited (if they so desire) to return to the Parish Hall after the funeral to meet relatives and friends and to share in some light refreshments. An increasing number of families are availing of this ministry which is being provided by five groups of men and women.

On January 22nd an organization for the men of the parish was launched with the first meeting of All Saints Men's Fellowship. Under the presidency of Herb Butler, the first year of operation was an unqualified success.

An All Saints Drama Troupe came together in the spring and put off a number of dramatic presentations during Holy Week. A second major production was staged on December 14 – a Christmas presentation entitled "I Am Gabriel".

On Wednesday mornings a group of mom's and children gather for friendship, support and learning. The gathering is called **Mom's and Tot's** and is proving to be a valuable outreach ministry.

On the last Sunday of the month a Folk Eucharist takes place in the parish hall with one of our three bands providing the music. Bishop Harvey has given permission for alternative eucharistic liturgies to be used at these services.

New material acquisitions at All Saints in 2003 included an LCD Multi-media projector; a new computer, copier and office chair; new robes and 25 copies of Common Praise for the choir; and new clerestory windows on the south side of the church.

<u>Awards:</u> On February 16 a plaque was presented to the parish designating All Saints Cemetery Number One as an historic property of the Town of Conception Bay South. This award recognizes the outstanding work of our Cemetery Committee and Custodian Joe Dawe in the beautification of all four of our cemeteries.

Also during 2003 the Knights of Columbus presented an award to All Saints Alpha for outstanding efforts in starting and promoting Alpha programs in our own parish and throughout our community. During 2003 a seventh and eighth Alpha Course were run at All Saints; to date, well over 500 persons have taken an Alpha Course in this parish.

All Saints continues to be involved in the Cursillo movement with a number of parishioners serving on team at two Cursillo Weekends. A Parish Ultreya in May brought together many of the more than 100 All Saints parishioners who have done a Cursillo course.

Security Issues: The security of church and parish hall has long been a concern of vestry. Early in the year efforts were made to make an inventory of keys in circulation. In the spring the exterior locks of the church and parish hall were changed. In spite of these measures, a major break-in of the parish hall occurred the night of September 10-11. Thieves destroyed the parish safe, stole some \$700 contained in the safe and broke open every locked door in the hall. At year's end, an A.D.T. Security System was installed in the church and parish hall; it is hoped that this system will provide the security and peace of mind that we were needing.

Ministry of Music: All Saints Senior Choir continues to render invaluable service both at regular liturgies and also at funeral services of which there were 48 in 2003. The choir continues to share with the choir of St. Thomas of Villa Nova in various ecumenical events: the World Day of Prayer Service in March and the joint Christmas program in December. During the year a plaque commemorating former organist Lance Reed was put in place near the organ. Gloria Greenslade's position as organist was made permanent.

All Saints continues to be blessed by the ministry of our three bands: Spirit of Song, the Alpha Band and Saints Alive (formerly known as the Fellowship Band). On December 19 the three bands put off a Family Musical Show; proceeds will be used to purchase additional sound equipment.

<u>Youth Matters:</u> Our Sunday School operated year-round in 2003 under the capable leadership of Superintendent Debbie Noseworthy. The Sunday School can always use additional teachers and helpers, but the small number of teachers that we do have, have done a truly amazing job.

In 2003 Foxtrap CLB Company celebrated its 50th anniversary. In honour of the anniversary, the Avalon Battalion East paraded to All Saints on the afternoon of Sunday, May 25th. On November 16th the CLB Regimental Band provided music for an evening worship service attended by the company.

Staffing: On May 9th Parish Secretary Madonna Lawrence retired after over six years of faithful service. Thirty applications were received for the secretary's position; a selection committee narrowed down the list to twelve; and Newfoundland Personnel Incorporated were hired to do the remaining screening, interviewing and checking of references. Ms. Kim Oake was hired on their recommendation and began her work on April 28th. After

successfully completing a six-month probationary period, Kim was made permanent in November.

During the summer of 2003, four students worked in the parish: three in the office and one with the caretaker. There was no theological student intern available to us in the fall; Nellie Thomas was the only third year student and she served her internship with Rev. Sandra Tilley at St. Mark's Church in St. John's. Jessie Broaders, who interned with us in the fall of 2002, was made a deacon in April and appointed Rector of the Parish of Fogo Island West. I was privileged to preach at Jessie's ordination to the priesthood which took place at St. Andrew's Church in Fogo on September 25th.

At year's end I indicated to vestry that I would be resigning as Rector effective August 31, 2004. By that time my wife Nellie will have been ordained by the Bishop of Western Newfoundland who sponsored her for ordination. In September we hope to be serving in neighbouring parishes in the Diocese of Western Newfoundland.

During 2003 there were 62 Baptisms, 26 Weddings, 48 Funerals, 10 young people participated in the Life in the Eucharist Early Communion Program and 94 young people were confirmed at two confirmation services.

In closing I would like to express my appreciation to my fellow staff members at All Saints: Rev. David, Associate Priest; Rev. Everett and Archdeacon Owen; Madonna Lawrence, our retired secretary; Kim Oake, our new secretary; Joe Dawe, our custodian; and Gloria Greenslade, organist and choir director.

We give thanks for all who give leadership in worship at All Saints: the members of our choir and bands, liturgical planners, sidespersons, greeters, eucharistic assistants, servers and altar guild, readers, those who lead the prayers of the people, those who prepare the gifts of bread and wine and those who organize these ministries.

We give thanks for all involved in Youth Ministry: the Youth Group, CLB, Sunday School, Twos & Tots, Life in the Eucharist, Confirmation Preparation, Vacation Bible School and the Theme Conversation people.

We give thanks for all who lead and share in Bible Study, Prayer Groups, Alongsiders, Pastoral Visiting, the Ministry to the Salmonier Correctional Institute, Meals on Wheels, Secretarial volunteers, the Fitness Group, the Food Bank Committee, the Mission & Outreach Committee and all other program activities of the parish.

And we give thanks to God for the ministries of the church wardens and Vestry, the Program Committee, the A.C.W., All Saints Men's Fellowship, the Cemetery Committee, the Catering Committee and the Finance Committee especially remembering our financial Advisor Mr. Barry Tilley.

REPORT OF THE ASSOCIATE PRIEST FOR VESTRY - 2003

My ministry with the Parish of All Saints this past year has been full, and life giving. I continue to learn more about life in this parish, and work with members of this parish in ministry.

My primary area of responsibility, that of Youth Ministry, has blossomed and grown. We continue with six lay leaders, Patricia Rideout, Lachelle Porter, Mandy George Nicole Penney, Mark Arnott and Jerry Fagan. Thanks be to God for their devotion and gifts. This year the Youth Group has grown from 8 members to 43, with an average attendance of 25. I am involved through ongoing education and support for these lay leaders and the youth. I have been asked to become involved at Queen Elizabeth High School – I am on the "SAFE & CARING SCHOOL'S COMMITTEE." It is good to see ministry with youth beyond the church.

In the spring I filled in directing the Youth Band (Spirit of Song) during the absence of Darryl Rideout. It was an enjoyable ministry. Ministry through worship with youth has continued with The Folk Eucharists, offering a worship experience and chances for youth to lead worship in a creative way.

Ministry has continued in other ways as well as with youth. The **All Saints Drama Troupe** was developed this past year, integrating drama, story and biblical reflection during our high feasts of Christmas and Holy Week/Easter. We were pleased to have Archdeacon Ian Dingwall with us for Holy Week – challenging our understandings of the Passion of Jesus. I am Gabriel, too, opened our eyes to the Christmas image. My thanks to Gina Pecore and all the Drama troupe (young and old) for their dedication, love and expression.

I became involved with Stewardship and Visioning over this past year through the Vestry, which continues to be a part of ministry. We had a successful visioning day in September, as we looked at our parish, and challenged each other as to where the vision of All Saints should be and where we need to go. In all we need to create a climate for giving to God, giving our lives, our gifts, our monetary resources and especially our worship through thanksgiving to God.

As I write this report I thank God for the support I have received from Staff this year, Canon Thomas, Madonna Lawrence, Kim Oake, Joseph Day and Gloria Greenslade, as well as from Vestry and Wardens. I thank God especially for Krista, Leah and Phoebe who offer me continuing support and love that enables me to move forward in ministry. I find sustenance in 2 Corinthians 4:7-8 as I feel like Paul I am a clay pot – holding the treasure of the gospel to share with others. I give thanks that God has enabled me to work in ministry together with you in this place.

A.C.W. ANNUAL REPORT NOVEMBER 27, 2002 – NOVEMBER 26, 2003

I am pleased to submit this report of our activities for the past year. The executive met twice this year to plan our meetings and events. Our meetings were well attended during the year. All of our meetings opened with devotions. Business meetings with reports from ACW departments were held monthly; other meetings consisted of fellowship, crafts or guest speakers.

In December we held our Christmas party which was catered for us by our youth group. We hosted parties for Seniors on January 6th and again in June. These are always enjoyed by the seniors and very well attended. We held our annual Valentine's party with ladies from other churches. This event is always a success and everyone enjoys the fun and fellowship we share together. We attended two Deanery Fellowships, one of which we hosted and prepared the order of worship for. We prepared the Seder Meal again this year and there was a favourable attendance. Some of our ladies attended the World Day of Prayer which was held at St. Thomas of Villa Nova. Some of our ladies attended a quiet day during Lent which was held at Lavrock. We were challenged to do a Lenten project for P.W.R.D.F. We did so with the parish participating and it proved to be very rewarding. We held our Pancake Supper again this year with the proceeds going to the School for the Deaf. We attended an evening of fun and fellowship with the Salvation Army Home League Ladies. This was thoroughly enjoyed; as the theme was "Old Fashioned Church" it brought back many fond memories.

During the year we had two guest speakers, one lady from Seniors Resource Centre who spoke on elder abuse, and another lady from Gideon's Auxiliary. We were pleased to have Canon Thomas with us in February; he did an Altar Guild workshop with us. This proved to be very informative and I'm sure we all learned from it.

Some of our ladies are involved with groups set up to provide lunch at receptions for families after funerals if the family requests it. We did Mother's and Father's Day items, which the children gave to their parents on these special occasions. This year we knitted and collected squares and sewed them together for blankets to be given to those needing them. Our ladies went on two outings this year; one to the School for the Deaf and another to Synod Office, followed by lunch at Portugal Cove. There were three outings this summer which were well attended and enjoyed. These times are ways we can keep in touch with each other during the summer. Some of our ladies helped with lunches at Vacation Bible School and also provided meals for the youth group retreat held in December. We held our Thanksgiving Dinner with entertainment and had a Rock-a-thon. Both events were rewarding and enjoyable. We took part in the Fall Fair as in other years. We also had two Flea Markets. Representatives from our ACW attended the Annual Meeting of the Diocese at

Lavrock. Many of our ladies are visiting the nursing homes on Tuesday afternoons for prayer and singing, also going to St. Luke's Homes every six weeks to serve tea and share fellowship with the residents. We had our ACW booth at the Market Place held in November. Every Monday our Craft and Sewing groups meet and they have contributed greatly to the Fall Fair and other sales held during the year. Bowling is ongoing and enjoyed by all who attend. Four of our ladies along with Topsail ACW provided soup and sandwiches and dessert for the Synod luncheon on November 14.

So you see we have had a very busy and rewarding year; the reports from the Treasurer and other departments will show this. I would like to say thank you to everyone who helped in so many ways. May you enjoy good health and happiness in the new year, and may the peace and joy of Christmas remain within your hearts all year. May God bless you all.

ANNUAL REPORT - FOXTRAP CLB COMPANY 4435

It gives me great pleasure to present to you the 2003 annual report of Foxtrap CLB. The company opened in September with approximately fifty young people. Once again, our LTC section was the largest with twenty-two members. The other sections are also off to a great start. I am very pleased to have a total of ten officers and four helpers. These helpers volunteer their time with the LTC section where the most help is needed. I would like to thank Sue Fagan, Loretta O'Brien, Maurice O'Brien, and Sheila Sparkes for their hard work and dedication.

Foxtrap CLB has had another busy year. Last year marked the fiftieth anniversary of this company. To help celebrate this event we had many activities including a pre-teen dance for the young people of the company and a Kitchen Party for the adults. We also hosted the Spring Parade that had a tremendous turn out and beautiful weather. To end the year, we held a second adult dance. At the Spring Parade it gave me great pleasure as current company commander to present Mrs. Frances Saunders with a plaque as an honor to her late husband, Gordon Saunders, who started the Foxtrap CLB fifty years ago.

In addition to all of these special events, we have been busy doing what is required of CLB members. Each section has been busy learning drills, earning badges, and participating in sporting events. Sections are active in the Battalion Sports program where they compete against other companies in the Battalion. Twice a year the company spends a weekend at the CLB Old Comrades cabin where we partake in fun-filled activities such as ski-dooing, fishing and sliding. Many thanks are extended to Calvin Butler who takes the time to come on these weekends to prepare our meals.

While the LTC section is not as competitive as the other sections they do fulfill what is required of them. Such requirements include learning basic drill movements, playing sports, going on field trips, and participating in the fun day at the Armory. They also have one sleep over a year at the parish hall.

Our year comes to an end with our annual banquet and the final meeting when parents are able to watch their children on a parade night. This is also the night that awards are presented.

CATERING COMMITTEE - 2003

The Catering Group had a very busy and productive year with the general fund receiving \$15,876.00 over and above all expenses. This money was raised by a relatively small group of volunteers.

Over the year, approximately 3,000 meals were prepared and served from the kitchen in the Parish Hall. Preparations for these meals included peeling and cooking 1,500 pounds of potatoes, 750 pounds of turnip, 650 pounds of carrots, along with cooking and slicing 300 pounds of beef, and 1,800 pounds of turkey. Desserts were also prepared and served for all catered meals.

In addition to all of this, the same volunteers gratefully helped other volunteers prepare and deliver meals for St. George's Day and Fall Fair business and takeout community dinners - totaling 4,000 meals. To make ready for these two events, 900 pounds of beef was cooked and prepared, along with 450 pounds of ham, 1,500 pounds of potatoes cleaned and made into salads, 400 pounds of coleslaw prepared, and 300 pounds of tomatoes sliced, plus other vegetables required to complete the salads.

All this said, it is good to have a group of dedicated volunteers who work hard to help support the parish. I believe much more could be achieved if the number of volunteers increased.
